Minutes of the 14th Annual Conference of ISNACC, Varanasi

8th - 10th February 2013

The 14th Annual Conference of Indian society of Neuroanaesthesiology and Critical Care (ISNACC-2013) was held at Varanasi during 8th Feb 2013 to 10th Feb 2013. It was organized by the Department of Anaesthesiology, Institute of Medical Sciences, Banaras Hindu University (BHU), Varanasi, under the stewardship of Prof. L.D.Mishra (Organizing Secretary and Convener). The theme for the conference was “Technological advances in neuroanaesthesiology and critical care” which was very relevant in the present scenario. Over 125 delegates from India and abroad attended the meeting.

The conference started with the workshop on “Transcranial doppler monitoring” which was conducted by Dr. Hemanshu Prabhakar [All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS), New Delhi] and Dr. Devendra Gupta [Sanjay Gandhi Postgraduate institute (SGPGI), Lucknow]. The participants had the opportunity to have the hands-on on the subjects and insonate the intracranial vessels. Another workshop on “Intracranial pressure monitoring and cerebral oxygen monitoring” was conducted by Dr. Bhadri Narayan [National Institute of Mental Health and Sciences (NIMHANS), Bengaluru], Dr. H K Venkatesh [BGS Global Hospitals, Bengaluru] and Dr. Sriganesh K [NIMHANS, Bengaluru]. Both the workshops were very well appreciated by one and all who attended it.

Post lunch session of the first day began with the continuous medical education (CME) program. The first lecture of this session was on “Role of tranexamic acid in controlling hemorrhage” by Dr. Shashi Srivastava (Lucknow). This was followed by three more lectures on “Oxygen therapy in head trauma patients” by Dr. Hemangi Karnik (Mumbai), “Guidelines for brain death” by Dr. Amna Goswami (Kolkata) and “Cerebral perfusion pressure in neurotrauma: what is optimum?” by Dr. Smita Sharma (Mumbai). Next session began with a lecture by Dr. JN Monteiro (Mumbai) who discussed on “Anaesthetic issues in cervical spine surgery”, followed by lecture on “Anaesthesia for awake craniotomy” by Dr. Arvind Chaturvedi (New Delhi). Dr. Katherine Gil (USA) elaborately discussed “Newer strategies and concerns during anaesthesia for epilepsy surgery”. This was followed by lectures on “Deep brain stimulation: indications and anaesthetic concerns” by Dr. Rajshree Deopujari (Mumbai) and “Anesthesia for high risk cardiac patients undergoing neurosurgery” by Kolli Chalam (Bengaluru).

A formal inauguration ceremony was organized at the conference venue. This was presided by the chief guest for the occasion Padmashree Prof. (Dr) Saroj Chooramani Gopal. The event was conducted in the presence of several dignitaries on the dais such as Prof. (Dr) R G Singh [Director, Institute of Medical Sciences (IMS)], Prof Mandavi Singh (Dean, Faculty of Medicine; BHU), Dr. Parmod Bithal (President, ISNACC), Dr. L D Mishra (Organizing Secretary, ISNACC 2013), Dr. Hemanshu Prabhakar (Secretary, ISNACC) and Dr. Girija Prasad Rath (Treasurer, ISNACC). A cultural programme followed the inauguration.



The second day of the conference started with Oration lecture which was the highlight of the morning session. The Dr. Malathi Oration on “Role of female gender hormones in neuroprotection” was delivered by Yoram Shapira (Israel) and Prof. Gode Oration on “Venous air embolism in neurosurgery” by Dr. Parmod Bithal (New Delhi). This was followed by two parallel sessions. One session was on “Newer technologies in neuroanaesthesia and critical care” which includes lectures on “Advantages of newer technology use in clinical practice and research” by Dr. Hemant Bhagat (Chandigarh), “Cerebrovenous oxygen saturation: jugular bulb venous oxygenation” by Dr. Yoram Shapira (Israel), “Use of TEE in neuroanaesthesia and critical care” by Dr. Rupa Sridhar (Trivandrum), “Monitoring and therapeutic strategies for intraoperative spinal cord protection” by Padmaja Durga (Hyderabad), “Use of newer technologies in neuroanaesthetic practice” by Dr. Sergio Bergese (USA), “Xenon anaesthesia for neurosurgery-future prospects” by Kavita Sandhu (New Delhi) and “Thinking beyond material resources” by Dr. Rajiv Chawla (New Delhi). Another session titled “Research based practice forum” included lectures on “Conducting research in Anesthesiology” by Dr. P Amorim (Portugal), “Neuroprotection by scavenging of blood glutamate” by Alexander Zlotnik (Israel) and “Traumatic brain foundation recommendations” by Dr. Zulfiqar Ali (Srinagar). The forenoon session ended with a series of lectures on “Paediatric & Neonatal Neuroanaesthesia and Pain”. These included a talk on “Anaesthetic considerations in paediatric neurosurgery” by Dr. Girija Prasad Rath (New Delhi), “Anaesthesia for neuroendoscopic procedures in children” by Dr. Devendra Gupta (Lucknow), “Postoperative pain management following neurosurgery” by Dr. Monica Tandon (New Delhi) and “Neuralgias & neuropathies; What’s new?” by Dr. KJ Choudhary (New Delhi).

Post lunch session on the day 2 began with lectures and discussion on “Head trauma”. Dr. Gyaninder Pal Singh (New Delhi) talked on the “Assessment of head injury patients” while “Fluid management in head injured patients” was discussed by Dr. Anju Grewal (Ludhiana). Dr. CK Pandey (New Delhi) spoke on “ICP monitoring in TBI: Does it improve outcome?” and Dr. Pragati Ganjoo (New Delhi) on “Perioperative complications in endovascular neurosurgery”. Dr. Bibhu K Das (Kolkata) highlighted the “Anaesthetic issues in patients with TBI”. Simultaneously, platform (free) paper presentations was arranged in which many delegates presented their research work and interacted with other members.

Following this, a General Body Meeting was held in the evening which was attended by all the delegates with great enthusiasm. In the meeting, many new suggestions were put forward by the members to expand the activities and improve the functioning of the society. Announcement regarding the formation of various committee (such as scientific committee, finance committee, education committee etc) to look into to the different activities of the society was made. The possibility to start a scientific journal of the society was explored and efforts taken towards it were discussed. The new elected members of executive body were introduced and the meeting ended with the announcement for the next ISNACC meets in 2014 at Jaipur. The day concluded with a boat ride in the holy Ganges river and everyone witness and appreciated the 'Ganga aarti'. This was followed by banquet dinner at Hotel Clarks Varanasi.

The final day's scientific program began with the poster presentation. The Hallmark of the morning session was the Prof. Hariwir Singh Oration, which was delivered by Dr. Dilip Kulkarni (Hyderabad) on "Prognostication in neurosurgical anaesthesia: An insight". This was followed by session on "Neurointensive care". This included lectures on "Respiratory complications in neurosurgical patients" by Dr. Mihir Pandia (New Delhi), "Ventilatory strategy for post craniotomy patients" by Dr. Badri Narayan (Bengaluru), "Ventilatory support in stroke patients" by Dr. Mukul Jain (New Delhi),

"Electrolyte imbalance and its management in Neuro-ICU" by Dr. Sandeep Sahu (Lucknow), "Postoperative & intensive care following posterior fossa surgery" by Dr. Shobha Purohit (Jaipur), and "Predicting survival in neurointensive care patients" by Dr. P Bhattacharya (Shillong). In another session on "Spinal trauma" Dr. M Srilata (Hyderabad) delivered lecture on "Airway management in cervical injury" while Dr. Kamal Kishore (Lucknow) discussed "Anaesthetic considerations in spinal trauma". In a parallel session on "Cerebral protection", Dr. G Parameswara (Bengaluru) highlighted on "Newer strategies for cerebral protection" while Dr. S Manikandan (Trivandrum) discussed "Preconditions for developing cerebral insult". Finally, in the "Pro and Con" session the speakers argued in favor (for) and against various debatable issues in clinical practice which included "Sitting position is useful in neurosurgery", "Steroids are useful in spinal cord injury", "Tight glycemic control is necessary in Neuro-ICU", "Low molecular weight heparin is useful in Neuro – ICU", "Colloids have a role in fluid resuscitation of TBI patients" and "IV paracetamol is good for postoperative analgesia following neurosurgery".

The meeting concluded with valedictory function and prize distribution for the best free paper (Dr. Nidhi Gupta, AIIMS, New Delhi) and best poster (Dr. Vidhu Bhatnagar, Trivandrum). The Organizing Secretary, on behalf of his team thanked the delegates for their active participation during the conference. The delegates cheered and applauded the host and the ISNACC Society.

Minutes of the 3rd Annual Conference of Asian Society for Neuroanesthesia and Critical Care - Feb 22-23, 2013 (ASNACC)

The 3rd Annual Meeting of ASNACC (Asian Society for Neuroanesthesia and Critical Care) was held at the Hotel Sanur Paradise Plaza, Sanur, Bali on Feb 22-23, 2013 in conjunction with 12th INA-SNACC and 4th Joint Symposium Indonesia and Singapore. This year, over 200 participants from all Asian as well international countries had participated including Indian participation. Dr H H Dash was the member of Scientific Committee for same. There were a total 7 participants from India. The registrants learned about many important and emerging topics in Neuroanesthesiology including quality and safety issues.

During this 2 day conference, faculties from the various countries such as China, USA, Korea, Indonesia, Singapore and Japan, lectured on various eminent issues regarding pre-, per- and post operative neuroanesthesia care. Dr Pinakin Gujjar (Mumbai) discussed the current issues of Anesthesia for Transsphenoidal Pituitary surgery and Dr H H Dash (New Delhi) delivered a lecture on “Role of Nitrous Oxide in Neuroanesthesia Practice”, which is always a burning topic in neuroanesthesia practice. Dr G S Umamaheswara Rao (Bengaluru) discussed the practical approach of “Cardiac Dysfunction in subarachnoid Hemorrhage and its management” in very simplified way. The intensive care issues for neurologic and neurosurgical patients were also discussed in details in fruitful manners.

The main attraction of the conference was practice update and poster presentation. Over 80 posters were presented from various participants all over the Asian countries dedicating to neuroanesthesia in this conference. My poster on the current issue of “Relevance of Automatic Cuff Controller for Assessment of Endotracheal tube cuff pressure in Neurosurgeries” which was appreciated. Another paper on “Venous Air Embolism” was presented by Dr Pramila Kurkal (Mumbai).

The conference was concise and a very useful panel for attending participants.

The 4th annual meeting of ASNACC in 2015 will be hosted by Korea.

In conversation with.....Dr. Nidhi Gupta

Dr. Nidhi Gupta, DM (Neuroanaesthesiaology) from AIIMS, recently published two of her research papers in International journals. Incidentally, for same work, she also won the best paper awards at the 14th Annual conference of ISNACC in Varanasi, this year in February. We took this opportunity to interview her and know more about her work and future plans.

HP: What was the reason for the select age group, 8 – 12 years, in your study?

NG: *We initially planned to carry out our study in children aged between 1-12 years old, as this is the age group frequently undergoing corrective surgery for spinal dysraphism at our centre. However, considering the less explored haemodynamic effects of dexmedetomidine in children in prone position surgery, we tailored down to an age group of 8-12 years old group first and then plan to study 1-7 yrs old in next phase.*

HP: How has been your experience with the use of dexmedetomidine?

NG: *The experience of using dexmedetomidine in children has been good and satisfying. When used as an anaesthetic adjuvant in the doses used in our study, the drug is safe and very effective in reducing postoperative pain and emergence agitation, commonly encountered in young children undergoing surgery with sevoflurane anaesthesia, thereby providing smooth recovery, which is highly desirable in neuroanaesthesia practice.*

HP: Following the results and findings of your study, have you changed your own practice?

NG: *We are using dexmedetomidine in children in few cases as a part of general anaesthetic but yes, not as a routine in every case. However, use of C-MAC along with a styletted endotracheal tube is a favoured alternative to fiberoptic intubation under general anaesthesia in patients requiring cervical spine immobilization during endotracheal intubation.*

HP: If there was something you wanted to change in your protocol for improving the quality of your study, what would it be?

NG: *In our dexmedetomidine study, we could have extended the period of postoperative observation upto a period of 6 hours at least, but most of the patients were shifted to neurosurgery ward after 2 -3 hours.*

Also, it would have been lot more informative if we could assess the effect of intraoperative dexmedetomidine on motor evoked potentials monitored in many centres during spine surgeries. This monitoring is at present not done in our centre.

In C-MAC study, we could have also fluoroscopically assessed the cervical spine motion with the two laryngoscopes.

HP: What are your suggestions for future trials on this subject?

NG: *We should now target the younger age group for studying the effects of intraoperative dexmedetomidine in children undergoing spinal surgery. Moreover, we can compare the effects of a single bolus dose or a lower infusion dose of dexmedetomidine without bolus dose to see whether they are as efficacious as a bolus of 1µg/kg followed by an infusion of 0.5 µg/kg/hr, as used in our study. For future trials with C-MAC videolaryngoscopes, it may be compared with other videolaryngoscopes in emergency settings in patients with unstable cervical spine and also in patients with other known parameters of difficult laryngoscopy.*

HP: What are your future plans, as a neuroanaesthetist and as a member of ISNACC?

NG: *As a neuroanaesthetist, I would love to work in a premier institute with neurospeciality and use my knowledge and skills I have acquired during my D.M training for the benefit of neurosurgical and neurocritically ill patients. I would also like to continue my passion for research and writing in this speciality.*

As a member of ISNACC, I would be an active member of the society and would contribute in the academic and teaching programmes as much as possible

The diligently worked out scientific program of this conference will bring innovations and advances in neuroanesthesiology to the forefront as we welcome attendees from all corners of the globe with the primary purpose of sharing information for the advancement of the super specialty.

The meeting will begin with a schedule of concurrently running Workshops, scientific sessions and oration on Friday and conclude with the formal Valedictory Function on Sunday. The scientific sessions on Friday and Saturday will be followed by Banquet dinner with delicious food, fine drinks and a vibrant cultural program.

“**Safe Paediatric Neuroanaesthesia**” being the theme for this conference, the entire first day pre-lunch session has been dedicated to the same.

The conference opens with inauguration and Dr. Tariq Wani's talk on Paediatric Airway Management followed by lectures on 'Fluid and Transfusion Therapy in Children' and 'Anaesthetic Management of Craniosynostosis' by Dr. Mary Abraham and Dr. Zulfiqar Ali, respectively. After a short tea break and oration by Dr. Kawaguchi on 'Evoked Potential Monitoring', Dr. Craig McClain will speak on 'Intracranial Brain Tumours in Children'. Later, Dr. Deepak Sharma and Dr. Piyush Patel will be delivering talks on 'Paediatric Traumatic Brain Injury' and 'Anesthetic Neurotoxicity in Neonates', respectively.

Another highlight of first day includes workshop organized on TCD by Dr. Devendra Gupta and another workshop on Mechanical Ventilation. The workshop on TCD will be organized to introduce basic principles and techniques of Transcranial Doppler Ultrasonography and its application to the practice of Neuroanesthesiology and will also include discussion on the specific applications of TCD ultrasonography and interpretation of TCD waveforms. Simultaneously lectures will be held on 'Incidental surgery in epilepsy' by Dr. Pragati Ganjoo and 'Surgery for seizure disorders' by Dr. Manikandan. These will be followed by a session including lectures on 'Critical care for SAH' by Dr. Michael Souter and 'Neuromonitoring in ICU' by Dr. Luzius Steiner. Evening session has been exclusively dedicated to 'Chronic Pain Management via spinal cord stimulation' by Dr. Nikesh Batra and 'Nerve blocks for LBA' by Dr. Naveen Malhotra.

The second day will commence with lectures by our distinguished **SNACC Panel** members - Dr. John Hartung, Dr. Jeffery Pasternak and Dr. Cor Kalkman, theme being "Neuroanaesthesia beyond the brain".
